

Subject: Language Arts

Objectives of Lesson: Familiarize students with recognizing and identifying all the key elements in stories such as rising action, climax, falling action, etc.

Materials Needed for Lesson:

- One Computer with Microsoft Office
- One Projector with a large screen and speakers
- Class of 30 students
- ☐ Hard Copy or Online copy of "The Three Little Pigs"
- Paper and Pencil for Notes

Procedure:


- 1. Have students pair up into groups of two.
- 2. Place each student and their partner at one computer.
- 3. On the overhead projector, pull up the story "The Three Little Pigs" and read it out loud as the students follow along.
- 4. Ask students to reflect on the story. Then have students define what they think plot means.
- 5. Have students identify the plot in "The Three Little Pigs"

Class Notes: Plot Outline



What is Plot?

Plot is the organized pattern or sequence of events that make up a story.



Elements of Plot:

Introduction: the beginning of the story where the reader is introduced to the setting, characters and the beginning conflict (what is going to happen)

Inciting Conflict:Introduces the first conflict in the story (the struggle between opposing forces)

Rising Action: the basic conflict becomes more complicated due to the introduction of secondary conflicts (things/obstacles that frustrate or get into the main characters way and cause trouble with him/her)

Climax: The high point of tension or excitement in a story; marks the turning point for the main character for either better or for worse

Falling Action: the excitement or tension becomes less intense, the main character ties things up with the antagonist where the main character either wins or loses

Resolution:Unanswered questions about the story or characters are answered at this point

Partner Assignment

- 1. On Microsoft Word, have the students write down the plot elements of the story that was just read to them (climax, falling action, etc.)
- 2. When students are finished, have each group present information to class and explain why they came to the conclusion they did

For example- students should answer this question: how did you come up with the climax? What made you think that?

**Remind students that both partners need to participate when presenting their plot elements of "The Little Pig's" to the class.
